Dutch, sociolinguistics, dialectology, vertical stratification, speech and writing proficiency, academic writing

Position of the course

Lectures: introduction to the vertical stratification of contemporary Dutch.

Exercises:

- Writing skills: refinement of the academic writing skills

- Oral skills: exercises and assignments (unprepared) on Standard Dutch.

Exchange students can participate in this course, provided that they have an advanced knowledge of Dutch (C1) and that they meet the beginning competences described below.

Contents

Seminar (15u): vertical stratification, i.e. introduction to the variation in Dutch (dialects, colloquial language, tussentaal, (sub)standard) and to language change processes of dialect shift and leveling, (de)standardization and demotisation. Language skills (30u).

Initial competences

This course builds on the competences acquired in the course 'Dutch Linguistics I: Language use'. Students are moreover expected to have a native or near-native competence of Dutch.

Final competences

- 1 To be able to describe the fundamental principles of dialectology and sociolinguistics, and to relate these disciplines to other linguistic paradigms.
- 2 To be able to describe existing variationist structures in Flanders critically and to relate them to sociohistorical factors.
- 3 To be able to identify the phonological, morfo-syntactical and lexical variants in different varieties of Dutch.
- 4 To be able to interpret different forms of diglossia, diaglossia, style-shifting, code-switching, dialect levelling, dialect shift, standard language ideology, destandardisation and demotisation.
- 5 To be able to correct and rewrite a formal text, both in language and in style.
- 6 To be able to write a well-structured, coherent and stylistically adequate scientific paper on the basis of self-collected literature, in clear and correct Dutch and with correct bibliographical references.
- 7 To be able to express oneself orally and unprepared in clear, consistent and correct Standard Dutch.

Access to this course unit via a credit contract is determined after successful competences assessment

Teaching methods

Seminar, Lecture, Independent work

Extra information on the teaching methods

Seminar on vertical stratification: students prepare articles, analysis and discussion in class

Exercises on oral and writing skills in smaller groups. During the semester, the students develop a speech portfolio and independently study a number of lexical and grammatical issues. Participation in the debate sessions is obligatory, as is the submission of a draft version of the academic paper.

Extra information on the examination methods

- Writing skills: (1) writing a scientific paper about a linguistic theme in line with the lectures and (2) style exercises and (3) writing a text or make an assignment related to style in professional texts.
- Oral skills: (1) exercise (unprepared) during semester; (2) taking an oral exam about the lectures.

Calculation of the examination mark

Content of the oral examination about the seminar: 50%

Exercises (writing and oral skills): 50%

Presence is obligatory during each moment of evaluation. Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the course evaluation, can not pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 8 out of twenty, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-deliberable mark (7/20).

Students who obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for either the seminar on the vertical stratification of Dutch or the language proficiency exercises cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (9/20).

As for all courses on Dutch Linguistics, the students are expected to develop their competences regarding reading, listening, writing and speech proficiency while preparing lessons, during the lessons, when giving presentations, writing a paper or taking a written or oral exam.

Facilities for Working Students

- 1 Possible exemption from educational activities (except compulsory exercises and moments of evaluation).
- 2 Possible rescheduling of the examination to a different time in the same academic year.
