Position of the course

Introduction to Old Norse, with a comparative Old Nordic perspective. Introduction to the history of the Scandinavian languages.

Contents

Introduction to the history of the Scandinavian languages, including runology and Old Norse. The course thus has both a synchronic and a diachronic focus. Texts from different Old Nordic languages will be read, analyzed and translated, in parallel with studying Old Norse grammar. Most of the reading material will be Old Icelandic, such as sagas, Eddic texts and others, but also Old Norwegian, Old Swedish and Old Danish texts will be read.

Initial competences

The student is a BA in linguistics and literature and has a knowledge of a Scandinavian language corresponding to the target competences of either Swedish Linguistics III, Norwegian, Danish or Icelandic

Final competences

- 1 After the course the students should be able to read any Old Norse and Old Nordic text, with the aid of critical sources and a dictionary, analyze it linguistically and recognize from which part of the Old Nordic linguistic area it originates.
- 2 Through practical exercises, the students should become familiar with the electronic resources available for the Old Scandinavian languages, which in turn should make them prepared for corpus research within Old Norse, in particular, and Old Scandinavian, in general.
- 3 Through intellectual work with research articles within Old Norse philology and Nordic language history, the students should be able to problematize the linguistic development of

the Nordic languages.
