### Position of the course

This course is conceived of as a text-oriented complement to the literary historical overview that is discussed in Swedish Literature II. In this way, the course connects competences from Swedish Literature I and Swedish Literature II and deepens them further.

### Contents

In addition to and completing the broad literary-historical overview that is central to Swedish literature II, Swedish Literature III approaches Swedish literary history rather from a micro-perspective through the discussion and analysis of a number of representative prose works, with a focus on the 20th and 21st centuries. Under the guidance of the lecturers, the students analyze relevant formal and thematic aspects and learn to exchange ideas in Swedish about the functioning of literary texts.

### Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course Swedish Literature I or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

### Final competences

- 1 Having a deepened understanding of text-oriented approaches to prose texts.
- 2 Having a deepened insight into Swedish literary history from the 19th century.
- 3 Applying those insights when contextualising and analysing Swedish prose texts.
- 4 Analyzing Swedish prose texts thematically and narratologically at an advanced level.
- 5 Involving secondary literature adequately in these analyses.
- 6 In good Swedish (CEFR level: B2) writing a literary text analysis in a clear and coherent manner, without using GAI tools in text production and/or editing.
- 7 Giving a presentation in Swedish on a literary analysis and participate in a discussion on this topic.

End-of-term evaluation (40%):during the exam students discuss their portfolio with the teachers.

Portfolio ("assignment") (60%): During the first lesson, the concrete contents of the portfolio are explained in detail. The portfolio includes both group assignments and individual contributions, and both assignments directly related to the contact moments and others. Active participation in class discussions is a requirement.

Re-sit: Oral assessment (50%) Portfolio ("assignment") (50%): those who fail to pass the portfolio, present a revised version.
