Position of the course

The course is given during the second semester of the first bachelor year.
 Exchange students are welcome to take this course. No knowledge of Dutch is needed. **Please contact the teacher before the course starts.**

Contents

The course introduces Swedish grammar, and covers some history of the language, and the basic principles of Swedish syntax, morphology and phonology. Special attention is paid both to linguistic aspects which set Swedish apart from other, primarily Germanic, languages and to linguistic aspects Swedish has in common with those languages. The topics are addressed both in theory and in practice, especially by exercises that aim to increase the students' language proficiency. The students' vocabulary is enlarged by 700 words on themes as language used in the media; sports and leisure; personal relations; work and economics. The students' grammar is enlarged by means of exercises on word order in subordinate clauses, adjectives in all forms (including *bestämd form*, *komparativ*, *superlativ*, *adjektiv i predikativ ställning*), and adverbs (*sättsadverb*, *satsadverb*). The course aims also at teaching students how to deal with more complex texts (e. g. articles in newspapers or short stories). Students will develop reading strategies by means of their basic knowledge of the Swedish language, and their awareness of the close relation between Swedish and Dutch.

Initial competences

To have completed Swedish language proficiency II or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To discuss and account for the basic principles of Swedish syntax, morphology and phonology;
- 2 The student can account for the possible variation in the Swedish clause

- structure, with a special focus on aspects where Swedish differs from Dutch;
- 3 The student is familiar with the Swedish terms for basic concepts of grammar (see list with grammatical terms and definitions on Ufora).
 - 4 To apply theoretical knowledge of Swedish grammar in order to produce Swedish clauses that are syntactically and morphologically correct;
 - 5 To compare the Swedish clause structure to the Dutch clause structure and to reflect upon language learning;
 - 6 To speak Swedish on B1-level as described in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages:
Interaction: to deal with most situations likely to arise while travelling in an area where the language is spoken. To enter unprepared into conversation on topics that are familiar, of personal interest or pertinent to everyday life (e.g. family, hobbies, work, travel and current events).
Production: to describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes and ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans. To briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.
 - 7 To write Swedish on B1-level as described in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages: to produce simple connected text on topics that are familiar or of personal interest. To write personale letters in which experiences and impressions are described.
 - 8 To understand spoken Swedish on B1-level as described in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages: to understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc. To understand the main point of many radio or TV programmes on current affairs or topics of personal or professional interest when the delivery is relatively slow and clear
 - 9 To understand written Swedish on C1-level as described in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages: to understand long and complex factual and literary texts, and to appreciate different text styles. To understand specialised articles and longer technical instructions.
 - 10 To apply grammar taught in this course in sentences and texts (based on the grammar dealt with in the courses Swedish language proficiency I and II); to use the vocabulary taught in the language exercises (see word list on Ufora).
 - 11 The student can give an outline of the history of the Swedish language.
 - 12 To conduct a small-scale linguistic research project in the field of Swedish linguistics and report on it in correct Swedish.
 - 13 To read and summarise a scientific article in the field of Swedish linguistics.

The end-of-term evaluation consists of a written examination. In preparation to the written exam, the students hand in two to four written tasks during the term. The written tasks are evaluated thoroughly but not graded. For details on the specific assignments, see the course schedule on Ufora.

Continuous assessment consists of one written assignment in which the students report a small investigation of a linguistic phenomenon.

Calculation of the examination mark

End-of-term evaluation: written examination (80%). The exam consists of two parts: linguistic theory (40%) and command of the language (40%).

Continuous assessment: written assignment (20%).

Students who have not passed one of the two parts of the end-of-term evaluation (the written examination) will get a maximum score of 9/20 for the entire course, irrespective of whether the combined scores for the written examination mathematically amount to a higher score.

If the student did not pass the continuous assessment in the first session, the writing assignment for the continuous assessment must be redone in the second session if (a) the student also failed at least one of the two parts of the written exam, or (b) the failing grade for the assignment alone resulted in an average final score of 9 or lower for the entire course.

The written assignments to be handed in during the course are not a part of the examination.

Facilities for Working Students

1. It is strongly recommended to attend class in order to complete the course successfully.
2. Possible rescheduling of the examination to a different time in the same exam period.
