Position of the course

This course unit aims to provide an introduction to the reception of antiquity in contemporary culture. The course provides an overview of (1) theories of reception studies, (2) the reception of Ovid's *Metamorphoses* and the transformation of human and nonhuman identity, and (3) the presence of antiquity in contemporary media (e.g., video games and social media). Participants will consider the role of Greek and Roman culture for the construction of Western identity.

Contents

This course consists of three parts.

In the first three meetings we shall discuss the most important terminology and approaches in reception studies.

In the second part we shall consider the complex and variegated reception of Ovid's *Metamorphoses* (1st century CE) in modern texts and movies. In particular, we shall discuss three kinds of reception of this highly influential Latin poem: 1) direct reworking of and clear references to episodes from the *Metamorphoses*; 2) thematic correspondances between Ovidian tales and modern literature and film; 3) Ovidian style of representation.

Finally, inspired by critical ancient world studies, the course approaches the reception of antiquity in recent media, discussing recent case studies in politics, social media and popular culture (e.g., video games).

Initial competences

To have an elementary knowledge of European history and art history as acquired in secondary education, complemented with general historical and cultural historical courses in Ba1, or having acquired these competences in another way.

Final competences

- 1 Being able to elucidate and actively apply central theoretical concepts and cultural-critical terms from the course.
- 2 Being able to elucidate and identify various forms of reception.
- 3 To have general insight into the perception and creative use of the classics within new cultural products from different periods and cultural movements.
- 4 Being able to autonomously gain insights into the forms, functions and cultural contexts of classical reception pertaining to specific cultural products and to communicate those insight in a scientific manner.
- 5 Being able to autonomously formulate a critical perspective on the contemporary social relevance of the course contents.
- 6 Knowledge of the metamorphosis as a central topic in both ancient culture and contemporary art and culture.
