Position of the course

This course teaches students to describe and transcribe a spoken utterance in English in a theoretical and descriptive phonological framework and makes them familiar with the basic principles of current phonological theories, contrastive phonology and phonological first and second language acquisition.

Note for exchange students: Exchange students wishing to take 'English Linguistics: Phonology' should be aware that this course partly builds on expertise gained in English Linguistics: Introduction and that a background in linguistics is hence expected.

Contents

This course deals with various aspects of the phonological description of the English language. Segmental aspects (isolated sounds, stress in individual words,

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allophonic variation) as well as suprasegmental aspects (prosody incl. intonation, stress in a tone unit and phenomena such as sound deletion, sound contraction, etc.) are taken into consideration. Additionally, a few topics are discussed in more detail, including. These can include, for instance, first or second langauge phonological acquisition or the relation between orthography and phonology.

Initial competences

- 1 describe and classify the vowels and consonants of English
- 2 describe in detail the movements of the speech organs and the airstream mechanism in the production of English sounds
- 3 master the key concepts of the phonetics and phonology of English, such as phonemes versus allophones, syllable structure, phenomena of connected speech, stress and intonation, etc.
- 4 phonemically transcribe English speech, with attention to aspects of connected speech, such as assimilations, elisions, reductions
- 5 conduct a contrastive phonological analysis
- 6 have insight into the principles in phonological first and second language acquisition and in speech learning models (e.g. Speech Learning Model, Perceptual Assimilation Model).
- 7 demonstrate the relation between phonology and orthography in English
- 8 be able to correctly interpret speech waves and spectrograms (acoustic analysis)
- 9 analyze speech samples in acoustic-phonetic software in order to gain insight into one's own pronunciation (and phonetic variation) or in that of other speakers
