Position of the course

This course aims to further refine the written and oral language proficiency of native Dutch speakers. In terms of writing skills, the focus is on academic genres, while also offering room for other professional text types. Oral skills primarily target proficiency in Standard Dutch in spontaneous, unprepared contexts. In addition, language accuracy remains an essential component of the course.

Contents

The seminars consist of several components. The 'Writing Skills' section builds on the foundational competencies developed in *Nederlands: Taalvaardigheid I*, with particular emphasis on writing style and text structure. You will learn the basic principles of academic writing and become familiar with other professional text

genres. You will also further develop your skills in text revision and editing—that is, improving and rewriting texts with attention to style and linguistic accuracy. In the 'Speaking Skills' section, you will be trained to express yourself spontaneously in a varied, clear, and correct manner in Standard Dutch. Specific attention is given to pronunciation, articulation, and intonation.

Initial competences

This course builds on the competencies acquired in the course *Dutch: Language Proficiency I*. A strong command of Dutch — at a native or near-native level — is essential.

Final competences

- 1 Students are able to edit professional texts with a focus on both style and linguistic accuracy.
- 2 Students are able to write a clearly structured, coherent, and stylistically appropriate academic paper, based on self-collected literature, in correct Dutch and with proper scholarly referencing.
- 3 Students are able to write persuasive and coherent professional texts in clear and fluent Standard Dutch. They can adapt text structure and writing style to suit the purpose of the text and its target audience.
- 4 Students are able to express themselves orally in Standard Dutch—both in prepared and unprepared contexts—in a clear, coherent, and correct manner, with precise articulation and appropriate intonation.
- 5 Students are able to use generative AI responsibly in the context of writing tasks.

Calculation of the examination mark

The final score is calculated by summing the scores for the various components of the periodical and non-periodical assessments. A special rule applies to the text editing test: the score for this test is not included in the final score, but if a student fails (less than 10 out of 20), a deduction of 2 points is made from the final score (out of 20).

Students must obtain a passing grade in both speaking and writing skills to pass the course. If the final score is 10 or higher out of 20, it will be reduced to the highest failing grade (=9). In this case, students must retake only the component they failed (speaking or writing) during the second exam period, but they must retake all assignments within that component. If a student passes both components (e.g., 11/20) but fails the language accuracy test, they will only need to retake the language accuracy test in the second exam period.

Students who do not participate in one or more exam assignments cannot pass the course. If the final score is still 10 or higher out of 20, it will be reduced to the highest failing grade (=9). In sum, students can only pass if they complete the entire exam.

Facilities for Working Students

Facilities:

- Possibility of exemption from attendance (except for mandatory exercises and evaluation moments, e.g., debates and the text editing test).
- Opportunity for feedback by appointment during office hours.
- Lecture recordings: limited and available upon request (not useful for practical exercises).
