Foucault, knowledge, power, truth

Position of the course

In this advanced course we investigate how Foucault's strongly historicised thinking about knowledge, freedom and power compares to more traditional epistemological questions.

Contents

We read some key texts from Foucault's oeuvre, discuss its internal evolution, and look at its relation to some of Foucault's direct sources of inspiration (Nietzsche and Canguilhem) and to the broader philosophical tradition.

We mainly discuss epistemological questions raised by his analyses: wat could it mean that there are "discursive formations" that constrain what is speakable and thinkable in determine periods of time? What is the status of a "will to knowledge" or "will to truth"? If power and knowledge cannot be disentangled, what does this imply for the ideal of "free knowledge"?

We possibly also discuss a number of contemporary authors who treat related themes (Latour, Serres, ...)

Initial competences

- Having a basic knowledge of the history of philosophy.
- Being able to read philosophical texts in French.

- 1 Having insight in the most important concepts within Foucault's thinking.
- 2 Being able to correctly asses Foucault's relation to philosophical tradition.
- 3 Being able to critically reflect on Foucault's work.
- 4 Being able to use Foucault's ideas in a reflection on contemporary phenomena.

- 5 Being able to develop a philosophical perspective on the relation between knowledge and its (changing) social and political context.
