Position of the course

This course is a fundamental preparation for the courses Spanish Literature I and II, Spanish-American literature I and II and for sociolinguistic aspects of Spanish Linguistics. It aims to give the students insight in the development of the countries where Spanish is the main language and in the cultures of Spain and Spanish-America

Contents

Part 1 offers a chronological survey of the social, political and cultural history of Spain emphasizing the importance of history to understanding critical phenomena in contemporary Spain.

Part 2 offers a chronological overview (capita selecta) of the social political and cultural history of Spanish-America emphasizing the importance of history to understanding critical phenomena in contemporary Spanish-America. Each chapter pays particular attention to a representative cultural artifact.

Initial competences

- To dispose of the historical and cultural preparation that is expected after high school
- To have completed the course Spanish Language Proficiency I or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means (at least level A2).

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Final competences

- 1 To be able to explain the most important social, political and cultural aspects of the Spanish-speaking countries.
- 2 To be able to relate the contemporary social and cultural aspects of the Spanish-speaking world to the history of the Spanish-speaking world.
- 3 To be able to interpret oral, written and audiovisual sources on the news in Spain and Spanish-America
- 4 To be able to summarise a cultural problem in correct written and oral Spanish.
- 5 To be able to make use of digital research environments and search strategies to identify research objects.

Extra information on the teaching methods

During the lectures, the study material is summarized and practiced. Class attendance is mandatory. In small groups, the students write an annotated bibliography in correct Spanish on a Spanish or Spanish-American topic based on sources about current events. Students attend mandatory guidance sessions for their bibliography in which they get feedback on their topics. They may be asked to attend lectures.

Extra information on the examination methods

The annotated bibliography is submitted at the end of the course. It is prepared and submitted in small groups. The students get feedback on their work.

Calculation of the examination mark

70% written exam (multiple choice and essay questions); 30% paper (group work) The bibliography must be written in correct Spanish.

Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the course evaluation cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be

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higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (=9). The student cannot pass the course evaluation if he/she doesn't pass the written assessment.

A partial exemption may be granted if the student passes the examination or assignment in the first examination (only valid between the first and second examination period). In case of failure, the assignment may be reworked.

Facilities for Working Students

- 1. Possible exemption from educational activities requiring student attendance, a second assignment can be imposed.
- 2. The examination can be rescheduled.
- 3. Feedback can be given by email or during an appointment.

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
