Position of the course

This introductory course wants to give insight into the specific characteristics of the ancient Greco-Roman religions, the fundamental differences between those religions and the current revelation religions and into the place and function of religion in classical societies. Aside from the main characteristics of the public cults, the focus is also on the ancient mystery cults and the so-called "oriental religions" (Cumont) and the parallels with early christianity.

The course introduces the students to the main characteristics of the religious "Umwelt" of early Christianity outside the Greco-Roman context: the Jewish tradition, ancient Middle East, Persia,... The course explains the factors that contributed to the emergence of early Christianity and gives knowledge of synchronic and diachronic diversity of the Christian tradition up until 500 AD.

Contents

Classical Antiquity

Introductory chapter on religion in general and the scientific approach to religion. Sketching the morphology of the classical religions: social dimension, religious practices (prayer and rites) presentations on the holy, religious experience. Presentation of the most important mystery cults and the so-called "oriental religions".

Christianity

This course deals with the emergence and development of Christianity as part of the religious history of the Hellenistic period. Its starting point is this period, from the third century B.C. to the Roman period, when the Middle East was characterised by a unity culture with Greek as its main language. Christianity as a historical phenomenon needs to be understood as a result of the influences Judaism underwent from this unity culture, but also from Persian Mazdeism. This course will offer an overview of the spread and development of early Christianity until roughly a century before the emergence of Islam. Special attention will go the immense diversity of early Christianity.
