Position of the course

The historical development of Dutch is more than the development towards standard Dutch. In the relatively new discipline of Historical sociolinguistics there is a focus on the sociolinguistic variation in the very earliest sources up to the recent past.

Contents

Starting from a number of case studies in the historical sociolinguistics of Dutch, we identify the relevant research questions, the available sources and the types of methodology that can be applied.

- 2 Knowing what (types of) sources are available for reconstructing (the variation in) spoken Dutch from the past.
- 3 Being able to deal with the methodological and ideological challenges when reconstructing (the social stratification of) spoken Dutch on the basis of written sources.
- 4 Being able to analyse a document in an older variety of Dutch according to the principles of historical sociolinguistics.
- 5 Being able to report on the research in oral presentation(s) and a paper.
