Position of the course

This general course provides students with an advanced scientific insight in some of the fundamental topics related to natural language and provide them with knowledge in the most important linguistic theories and methods of the 20th and early 21st century.

Contents

A review of linguistic theories and methods of the 20th century:

- 1) a critical overview of structural, functional, cognitive and generative linguistic models;
- 2) a comparison of the different models with respect to their field of study, modes and levels of linguistic description and the research methods used;
- 3) applications of different theoretical approaches to concrete linguistic data.

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course 'Introduction to (Text)Linguistics' (general course 1st Bachelor) or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To know the most important modern linguistic trends and methods and to be able to compare them with one another.
- 2 To have an insight in language in a broad sense, from different perspectives.
- 3 To reflect critically on the necessary distinctions and concepts in linguistic research.
- 4 To be able to apply different theoretical approaches to linguistic phenomena.
