### Position of the course

This basic course situates the personal field of study in a broader social and cultural perspective with the possibility of laying personal accents. Furthermore, scientific and methodological aspects of the personal field of study will be extended in order to create an insight in the state of affairs of that field of study. The course wants to expand the general academic and field specific skills, including oral presentation.

### Contents

Through a number of classic case studies with respect to the artistic production in the Southern Netherlands during the 15th century (the so-called 'Flemish Primitives'), such as the division of hands in the Ghent Altarpiece of the brothers Van Eyck, the course provides insight into the historiography, the critical analysis of visual and written sources, and into traditional as well as recent methods of research. Much emphasis goes to the contribution of natural scientific research methods to current discourse in the discipline.
