Myth, mythical thinking, mythology, mythography, classical culture and its inheritance, Greek and Roman gods

Position of the course

Introduction to the functioning of myths in past and present times - more specifically (but not exclusively) the cononical stories from Greek and Roman antiquity. A number of methodological approaches will be discussed.

Contents

The lessons start with important (clusters of) myths, i.e. the actual stories: the birth of the gods and creation of man; Persephone and Hades and other fertility myths, the connection between life and death; Prometheus; Orpheus, Eurydice and other journeys to the underworld; the Trojan war and the role of women; Iphigeneia and other hunt and sacrifice stories; Heracles and other great heroes; Jason and the Argonauts - and Medeia; Oidipous; Theseus; With these figures, motives and themes three important points of interest of mythology as a discipline are illustrated:

- (1) the, mostly literary, sources of our knowledge of classical myths;
- (2) the importance of those myths in the classical world;
- (3) the modern reception of those myths, in the creative field (figurative art, literature, performing and audiovisual arts), as well as in the scientific (philosophical, anthropological, psychological, historical) theories (the most important interpretative and explanatory models of the 19th and 20th century)

Initial competences

Elementary and general foreknowledge of (art) history.

Final competences

- 1 Students should be able to express the meaning of the concepts 'myth' and 'mythical thinking' and to explain what problems and questions these concepts may pose.
- 2 Explain the different sorts of myths and their function in several aspects of the classical world (religion, art, politics, literature)
- 3 Know the most important mythological figures and the stories in which they figure
- 4 Be able to recognize and explain popular mythological scenes in figurative art
- 5 Explain and interpret mythological allusions and references in modern literature
- 6 Be acquainted with the most influential schools in the modern study of mythology, together with their most important representatives
- 7 Be able to use the standard reference works for the study of classical mythology
- 8 Acknowledge the importance of stories and perceive how mythic narratives and images keep structuring and steering human acts and thoughts, even in modernity.
- 9 Reflect critically upon the positive or negative impact of certain myths on the individual and society.
- 10 To appreciate the beauty and cultural value of mythical images and stories.
