Anthropology, society and culture, history of anthropology, history of colonisation and missionisation, postcolonialism and decolonisation

Position of the course

This introductory course (a General Educational Requirement for bachelor students) aims to introduce students to the discipline of anthropology: culture, nature-nurture debates, religion, identity and diversity are treated. Positionality is unpacked as central to the anthropologist's method. The importance of the ethnographic method for 'knowing' is illustrated through casestudies and audiovisual material.

Contents

- Critical overview of the main anthropological theories, anthropologists, and ethnographies.
- nature-nurture, origins of man, scientific racism.
- subfields of anthropology such as material culture and art, kinship, economics, politics, religion, globalisation and contemporary society and culture.
- With a constant focus on methodology: ethnographic fieldwork and participant observation.
- Current debates: colonial monuments, colonisation, postcolonialism and

decolonisation, the white world as a "center" "as opposed to" "the periphery".

Initial competences

Final competences

- 1 To gain insight in the main concepts and theories of the anthropological discipline.
- 2 To gain knowledge and insight in scientific and structural and systemic racism.
- 3 Able to distinguish the different views on the human and the power differentials that formed them.
- 4 Having knowledge about non-Western cultures en local processes of change.
- 5 Being able to anthropologically frame debates on culture and the comparison of cultural traditions.
- 6 Being able to demonstrate the epistemological importance of the ethnographic method and the study of lifeworlds.
- 7 Recognize concrete applications of a reflexive and 'emic' research attitude, as well as 'etic' attitude and one's own positionality.
- 8 Being able to critically assess information, produced by the different kinds of media, about globalization and local lifeworlds.
