### Teaching languages

### Position of the course

This advanced course wants to make the students familiar with important poetic genres. It also demonstrates how to apply methods of ancient and modern literary theory to ancient Greek literary texts.

An important side-objective of the course is to have the students read canonical texts, both in Greek and in translation.

Exchange students may take up this course unit. The lecturers will provide an alternative with proper guidance, for which no prior knowledge of Dutch is required. Exchange students will be set an alternative exam.

### Contents

Literary texts from some of the canonical genres: complete texts (e.g. a tragedy; a comedy) and/or long representative parts (e.g. some books from epic). Study of the cultural and historical context; reading and interpretation of the Greek text.

2023-24: Drama, especially Tragedy (Sophocles' Philoctetes in-depth, other plays in a more cursory way). Related texts: Aristophanes' Frogs, Aristotle's Poetics.

### Initial competences

To have completed the courses Classics in Translation, Ancient Greek Literature I, Ancient Greek linguistics I and Literary Theory, or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Students are expected to have a good knowledge of Attic Greek (morphology, syntax) and a basic knowledge of Greek metre (iambic trimeter).

### Final competences

- 1 To have a knowledge of the historical meaning and place of the studied texts and genres within the evolution of ancient Greek literature.
- 2 To be able to put the methods of analysis of literary theory into practice.
- 3 To be able to explain and indicate metrical, stylistic and thematic characteristics of the studied genre in selected passages.
- 4 To be able to understand, explain and interpret Greek literary texts.
- 5 To be able to read Greek texts independently making use of standard academic tools (dictionaries, editions and commentaries).
- 6 To be able to present the results of one's research to the fellow students (exercise in presentation skills).
