French linguistics, clausal syntax and semantics, information structure, text linguistics, discourse, linguistic methodology, research skills

Position of the course

This course builds on the insights gained in the courses French Linguistics I (analysis of the internal structure of the sentence) and French Linguistics III (semantics and pragmatics). The main focus of this course is on the meaning and variation with respect to the construction of the sentence, under the influence of larger entities such as text and discourse (information structure; reference). Both written and oral language are discussed.

Contents

The course consists of two parts:

(1) Analysis of syntactical variation - functional perspective

(2) Text linguistics - text coherence - discours - discourse markers - structuring role of prosody - typology of text genres, including computer-mediated discourse

Students will learn to use modern linguistic analyses, as well electronic corpora and annotation tool.

Initial competences

To have attended the courses French Linguistics I and French Linguistics II or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means. The level of proficiency is B2-C1.

Final competences

- 1 to be able to recognize and analyze clausal patterns, both formally and semantically/pragmatically, by means of a solid conceptual apparatus
- 2 to be able to apply the linguistic conceptual apparatus to new examples and text fragments
- 3 to present, motivate and confront analyses of data within a team
- 4 to be aware of the fact that spoken languages have their own structures and rules, which make them very relevant to linguistic research
- 5 students master (passively) a broader array of syntactic structures, including those typical of spoken language, and extend their vocabulary through the exercises
- 6 to collect authentic examples, partly on the basis of existing corpora
- 7 to get acquainted with the basic concepts of prosody
- 8 To be able to use an annotation tool for oral language use
- 9 academic language proficiency in oral presentation and written text at level C1

Interactive lecture (on campus) + seminars (most often via Bongo, streaming).
For some parts, the principle of flipped classroom is applied. Students prepare parts of the subject matter themselves, part by reading through the course notes, part by watching online videos.
