Position of the course

This specialized course is a continuation of the Bachelor's Program in Italian and offers an indepth study of specific topics of Italian literary history, cultural history, and cultural memory.

Contents

This module offers students an overview of various theoretical approaches to literary analysis, highlighting the breadth of possible interpretations of a text and the central role of literature in diverse theoretical and social contexts. The core text under examination is Elsa Morante's *La Storia* (1974), which will be analyzed through lenses such as cultural memory and trauma studies as well as adaptation and feminist theories. Through this exploration, students will gain a deeper understanding of how different theoretical perspectives shape our comprehension of literature – and the world - and the significance of literature within society.

Initial competences

This completion course following the bachelor's degree in Italian provides an in-depth study of a specific topic in Italian literature and Italian cultural history. Students have a basic knowledge about Italian 20th century history and excellent command of the Italian language.

Final competences

- 1 Acquire knowledge of key aspects of Italian memory culture pertaining to Fascism, World War II, and the Holocaust
- 2 Develop the ability to construct critical readings of a text using various theoretical frameworks.
- 3 Use literature as a tool to address and critically engage with significant events of 20th-century history.
- 4 Develop insights into theories of cultural memory and trauma studies, adaptation and

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feminist theories.

- 5 Gain Advanced knowledge of Italian language (B2/C1)
- 6 Writing a book review for a non-specialist audience.

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Calculation of the examination mark

Students who fail or do not participate in the evaluation of one or more parts of the course can no longer pass for the whole of the course. If the average final score would still be a figure of ten out of twenty or more, this will be reduced to the highest nonsuccessful digit (= 9). In the second examination period the student only has to redo the part of the exam that he didn't pass in the first examination period (partial exemption).
