As far as attitudes are concerned, this course aims to stimulate global responsibility.

Contents

The possible orientations and contents of a global ethics.
Implications of globalisation for individual responsibility.
Specific case studies of current societal problems linked to globalisation.

Initial competences

Understanding the basic concepts, central approaches, theoretical frameworks and important developments in ethics.

- 1 Understanding the complexity of the problems facing a globalised world with regard to moral values and norms.
- 2 Being able to assess publications relevant to global ethics and global justice (in academic journals as well as media reports) as regards their relevance, strength of argumentation, and scientific evidence base.
- 3 Knowledge of key sources regarding globalisation, world ethics and world politics.
- 4 Being capable of understanding, critically commenting and independently

applying general theoretical approaches and specific arguments in the field of global ethics.
