Literary movements in Europe

Position of the course

This general introductory course aims to elucidate the coherence and the development of the major literary currents in Europe since the Middle Ages.

The course ties in with the general objectives of a BA in literature: a study of oral and written texts in their broad historical, cultural, and philosophical contexts. These insights prepare the students for advanced courses in literary theory: first, for Comparative Literature (BA3), but also for the literary theory courses in the Master Comparative Modern Literature. The knowledge acquired in this course also enables students to situate the literatures taught in various programs (Germanic, Romanic, Oriental, African, and Slavic languages).

Contents

Survey of literary currents and their contexts, divided into six sections (Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque/Classicism, 18th century, 19th century, and 20th century). Each section entails a cultural-historical situation, a survey of literary characteristics, and a discussion of the major literary exponents. In addition, a number of canonical texts are discussed as representative for the literary current under study.
