Position of the course

Thorough introduction to Old Dutch, both to the texts and text genres, and its study.

Contents

Students will be introduced to the texts and text genres in Old Dutch, and to its study. The texts will be put in their historical, cultural, linguistic and literary context. To enable a thorough reading of the texts, students will be introduced into the grammar of Old Dutch. This leads to the rendering of Old Dutch texts (fragments) into modern Dutch, through the help of relevant instruments (dictionaries, grammars, secondary source material).

Initial competences

- Advanced knowledge of modern Dutch.
- Be able to handle academic literature.

Final competences

- 1 To have acquired insight into the structure and characteristics of Old Dutch
- 2 To be familiar with the history and text genres of Old Dutch
- 3 To have acquired the skills to understand and contextualize texts which were not discussed during the course
- 4 To have an excellent knowledge of Dutch and to be able to use it fluently in various contexts.
- 5 To evaluate actively and critically literary-theoretical methods of analysis and to use them in the approach of new problems.
- 6 To evaluate critically phenomena and processes of historical, cultural and socio-political nature in the Dutch region.
- 7 To have a critical insight into the international specialist literature and the latest evolutions in the field and inside various methodologies of research.
- 8 To apply critically theoretical models and methods of analysis to complex problems.
- 9 To have a strong linguistic awareness: valuing the crucial role of language in human interaction and cultural production and handling language according to that awareness.
- 10 To show an attitude of scientific curiosity and lifelong learning.

Non-periodical evaluation: skills test (translation from Old Dutch to Modern Dutch), assignment (processing of read articles), participation (attending and actively contributing to the lesson(s) in which we collectively translate an Old Dutch text)

Calculation of the examination mark

Non-periodical evaluation: 100%

=> assignment: 40%

=> skills test: 50%

=> participation: 10%

If the student is absent without a valuable reason at or does not take part in (a part of) the assessment moments, then he or she can not pass and will, if his or her total would be more than 8/20, get a final score of max. 7/20.

Nota bene: if a student violates the d/t-rules two times or more in one of the written parts (assignment and skills test), the score for that specific part will be a maximum of 9/20. In the evaluation of the written parts, content, style, spelling and the incorporating and correct reporting of the used sources will be taken into account.
