Position of the course

In this introductory subject insights are offered into the linguistic aspects of Flemish Sign Language and the Flemish Deaf Community, next to a restricted basic competence in Flemish Sign Language.

Contents

Linguistic aspects of sign languages versus spoken languages, with specific focus on phonological, morphosyntactic, lexical and sociolinguistic aspects of Flemish Sign Language

Initial competences

No requirements concerning prior knowledge of Flemish Sign Language and the Deaf community in Flanders.

Final competences

- 1 Analyzing the phonological, morphosyntactic and lexical structures of sign languages, and in particular of Flemish Sign Language (e.g. VGT structure, typology, language variation).
- 2 Evaluating existing views on deafness, Flemish Sign Language and Deaf culture
- 3 Interpreting the sociolinguistic context and aspects of Deaf culture
- 4 Interpreting the developmental linguistic context and educational context of deaf children
- 5 A limited basic language proficiency in Flemish Sign Language
- 6 Project-based interdisciplinary collaboration to translate content into a practical context

1. Continuous evaluation: interdisciplinary group work (20%)
2. end-of-term evaluation: oral exam

Calculation of the examination mark

- oral exam (16/20)
