Ancient rhetoric, theory and practice, rhetoric and literature, rhetorical education in Antiquity, sophisms, persuasive strategies in modern speeches

Position of the course

This basic course gives knowledge of and an insight into the historical development and the functioning of ancient rhetoric (the production of texts, stylistics, argumentation), the rhetorical analysis of ancient texts and the post-classical development of rhetoric. Attention is paid also to the adoption of ancient rhetorical theories and strategies in non-classical texts, such as speeches of the US president Barack Obama.

Contents

The history of ancient rhetoric from the sophists to the rhetorical school manuals of late Antiquity; the functioning of ancient rhetoric as a system for both text-production and textual analysis; ancient stylistics; ancient informal logic; fallacies; the rhetorical organization of literature; ancient rhetorical techniques in modern speeches.

Initial competences

Knowledge of Latin or Greek is **not** required for students in order to follow this course.

Final competences

- 1 To have an insight into the historical development and the functioning of ancient rhetoric (the production of texts, stylistics, argumentation)
- 2 The rhetorical analysis of ancient texts (in translation) and modern speeches.
- 3 To have an insight into the post-classical development of rhetoric and the application of rhetorical theories for the analysis of non-classical texts
- 4 To think critically about the rhetorical encryption of ancient and non-ancient (literary, social, political) communication.
