Position of the course

This is a course for first-year students, who have done their first steps in the programme. On the one hand, it builds on the language proficiency training in the first semester: now the students take the floor and thus bring their writing and speaking skills to a higher level. On the other hand, this course addresses the training of the basic techniques of literary scholarship and its heuristics. In this manner, students get a better insight in textual processes, they learn how to systematize their own impressions and sharpen their attention for formal and stylistic characteristics of literary texts (prose, poetry and drama).

Contents

First, the students get a number of hands-on-sessions for text analysis under the supervision of the teachers. Then, they come forward and carry out a number of well-guided and coached practical exercises, such as writing exercises, short oral presentations and discussions. By means of intermediate feedback, the students are able to monitor their own study advancement well. The accent lies on analysis, structuring one's findings, and the composition and presentation of an argument, both oral and written.

Initial competences

Final competences

- 1 To have a basic command of German and to be able to apply it in oral and written communication.
- 2 To be familiar with the basics of literary theoretical discourse (terminology, jargon) and to be able to apply this knowledge.
- 3 To master research strategies on a basic level.
- 4 Digital skills: Understand the principles of digital analysis methods and use them to perform analyses (content, network, relational, spatial, structural, or stylistic).

Teaching methods

Seminar, Practical, Independent work

Extra information on the teaching methods

In this practicum, the students practice writing, speaking and discussion skills in German.

Seminar exercises in small groups of 20 students, with writing tasks, two "reaction papers", an oral presentation, individually or in pairs; discussions.

The students autonomously go through a reader with two scholarly texts to prepare for a group discussion:

- Practicum (30h): Students are divided into groups of about 20. They each prepare an exercise in digital text analysis, a reaction paper and a larger assignment. They give a presentation and actively contribute to group discussions.
- Independent work (7.5h): The students read a chapter from the handbook to prepare for the class discussion
- Seminar (7.5h): The students are offered the tools to discover literary texts from different genres in order to make use of them later on.

Assessment moment

Periodical: oral exam and paper

periodical: continuous assessment - 1 short presentation and 2 "reaction papers" and participation

(If a student does not pass the non-periodical evaluation, a second chance is offered by means of a compensatory activity between the first and second exam period.)

Assessment form

Oral exam with written preparation. Questions will be asked on the methodological introduction, on the analyses presented as an example, on the paper, on the insight into the other problems presented in class and test the students' elementary knowledge with respect to literary studies.

Calculation of the examination mark

Presentation: 20%

Paper: 30%

Oral exam: 30%

Participation (discussion, opponents): 10%

reaction paper + discussion: 5%

Digital humanities analysis: 5%

+ (optional): regular attendance and participation in tutorial sessions: extra mark
