Latin poetics and poetry, late antiquity, Ausonius, Claudian, Rutilius Namatianus, Sidonius Apollinaris, Venantius Fortunatus, itinera en travel texts, displacement, interruption, landscape, ecopoetics.

Position of the course

This course focusses on late Latin poetics through the reading of various texts. The problem of originality of late Latin poetry will be at the center of our discussion. Is it possible to acknowledge late Latin poetry per se without using the lens provided by classical poetry?

Contents

We read and discuss the work of Ausonius, Claudian, Rutilius Namatianus, Sidonius Apollinaris, Venantius Fortunatus and other late Latin authors within the specific context of a late antique poetics. We shall proceed thematically. On the same time our course shall be an exercise in literaire hermeneutics since we are going to read the texts without paying attention to their authors' biography, their historical context or their intertextual relations to other texts. Instead we will consider contributions to literary theory and aesthetics. Finally we shall pay attention to the role of landscape, the environment and other non-human elements.

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the Bachelor of Linguistics and Literature, with Latin as one of the two chosen languages, or the postgraduate course in Latin

- 6 To be able to apply the acquired insights in an analytical discussion of stylistic and literary aspects
- 7 To be able to apply a literary-scholarly question to a specific text
- 8 To be able to draw up, present and defend a scholarly argument in front of an audience
- 9 Insight in ecocriticism and ecopoetics

Independent reading of Latin texts on the basis of a literary question (25%)
