Position of the course

In this course unit, students gain insight into the integration of various humanities disciplines, and in particular (cultural) anthropological research questions and methods, into the cultural-historical study of the Middle Ages and the early modern period. The course unit is situated within the tradition of historical anthropology and the new cultural history as developed since the late 1980s.

Contents

Seminars that focus on key themes from historical anthropology and cultural history through case studies. These case studies place particular emphasis on the confrontation between interdisciplinary theoretical literature and empirical research. Some examples of topics that may be addressed include:

- group cultures
- cultural appropriation
- perceptions of death
- rituals
- leisure
- animals
- drinking
- gender
- religious violence
- emotions
- memory
- ...

Initial competences

The students have a solid basic knowledge of Western European history, acquired during their Bachelor's program.

Final competences

- 1 To have an advanced critical understanding of the historical conceptual framework, as well as of historical facts and interpretations.
- 2 To be able to apply knowledge and insights from related social and human sciences, anthropology in particular, to historical research and/or professional activities.
- 3 To be able to critically analyze, contextualize, and integrate historiographical debates within historical anthropology and cultural history into research.
- 4 To be able to make self-critical and value-aware judgments about historical issues and systematically approach problems from multiple perspectives (multiperspectivism).
- 5 To be able to correctly interpret and use historical sources and scholarly literature in Dutch and other languages—at least English and French.
- 6 To be aware of and to be able to critically reflect on the complexity of history, recognizing that every perspective on the past is bound by place and time and is never value-free.
