Position of the course

Acquire insight into the application of (cultural) anthropological research methods in historical research on the Middle Ages and Early Modern Times, and in the specificity of historical anthropology as developed by historians since the late 1980s.

Contents

Seminars in which case studies are used to discuss a number of important themes from historical anthropology, with emphasis on the confrontation of interdisciplinary, theoretical literature and empirical research. Some of the topics that can be dealt with:

- group cultures
- cultural appropriation
- death
- rituals
- leisure
- animals
- drinkinggender
- religious violence
- emotions
- memory
- ...
