Position of the course

This advanced course unit aims to provide the students with more in-depth knowledge of the particularities of Hindi through poetry, film dialogues, songs, news reels, interviews... The students also learn how to write about more advanced topics. Students are expected to conduct oral presentations and conversations (with a native speaker) about more advanced topics.

Contents

- Translate literary Hindi and comprehend and analyse its complex grammatical structures.
- Oral drills of complex grammatical structures.
- Read and interpret articles from news websites as well as magazines and situate them in political, economic and social contexts.
- Listening skills are further developed, through Hindi film dialogues and songs as well as other exercises.
- Contextual as well as free writing exercises.
- Speaking skills are further developed through oral presentations and conversation exercises in everyday contexts.

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the courses Hindi III and IV or to have acquired the necessary skills by any other means.

Final competences

- 1 To be able to translate Hindi literary and media texts with a complete insight in grammar and content.
- 2 To be able to situate the texts within their socio-cultural and political framework.
- 3 To be able to apply complex grammatical structures.
- 4 To be able to read and translate newspaper articles on social, political and economic topics.

- 5 To be able to understand, interpret and contextualize Hindi film dialogues. To have extended listening skills.
- 6 To be able to write Hindi on an advanced level.
- 7 To be able to give oral presentations and conduct a dialogue (with a native speaker) about more advanced topics.

Teaching methods

Seminar, Lecture, Independent work, Peer teaching

Extra information on the teaching methods

- Seminars: guided reading, speaking, writing and listening exercises. Guided translation of texts in class.
- Lectures: explanation of cultural, literary and media contexts by the lecturer.
- Individual presentations (micro-teaching).
- Independent work: the students need to prepare the texts and exercises at home. Composition. Language portfolio.

Course content-related study coaching

- In the practical language acquisition classes all theoretical knowledge is immediately put into practice. These classes consist of reading, conversation, listening, and written exercises. Immediate feedback is possible in the conversation exercises. The written exercises are corrected by the language teacher or during class and – if necessary – discussed with the individual student. This guarantees a quick feedback for the individual student.

Extra information on the examination methods

Periodic evaluation:

- Oral examination: test of listening and speaking skills about an advanced topic, the reading of literary and media texts with a series of open (subject matter and context) and closed (grammar) questions.

Permanent evaluation:

- Participation: active participation during exercises, individual presentations, making homework.
- Portfolio.

If a student does not pass the periodic and permanent evaluation, a second chance is offered by means of an exam during the second exam period. If participation is insufficient, a replacement task will be given. It is however preferable that students participate in the course of the academic year. As regards the portfolio, a second chance is given between the first and second exam period.

Calculation of the examination mark

Periodic (40%): oral exam (40%) and permanent: portfolio and Ufora assignments (50%) and participation (10%). The students have to succeed in all parts.

Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the course evaluation or obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for one of its parts cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (= 9).

Facilities for Working Students

1. Student attendance during educational activities is required.
2. The examination can be rescheduled.
3. Feedback can be given by email, telephone or during an appointment during office hours.
