**Position of the course**

This advanced course discusses the methodology of the study of language families, language typology, the development of Chinese dialects, a comparative approach to the developments of East Asian writing systems, manuscript studies, and East Asian linguistics, including historical linguistics and phonology (modern and historical) as well as the impact of language contacts on the development of East Asian languages.

The focus is on Chinese.

**Contents**

In intensive thematic lessons several topics are discussed on the basis of scholarly research: East Asian linguistics, language families, East Asian languages and dialects, language typology, East Asian writing systems, phonology, hand-written manuscripts, historical lexicography, and historical linguistics. The focus is on Chinese.

**Initial competences**

To have successfully completed the course Modern Chinese IV and Classical Chinese IV or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

For the participation by Japanology students, a basic knowledge of Classical and/or Modern Chinese is recommended.

To have good knowledge of English.

**Final competences**

1 To be able to indicate linguistically and geographically the languages and dialects of China.

- 3 To have a good knowledge of the methodology of linguistic research of Chinese.

Assessment method:

Periodical: written examination (70%)

Non-periodical assignment (30%)

Assessment form:

Written exam: There is a written examination, counting for 70% of the final mark.

The focus lies on the knowledge of the methodology of linguistic research of Chinese, and of the methodology of the study of language families, East Asian languages and dialects, language typology, East Asian writing systems, phonology (historical and modern), aspects of language contact, historical lexicography, historical linguistics, and manuscript studies.

Assignment: In-class assignments count for 30% of the final mark and consist of various exercises.

#### **Calculation of the examination mark**

The periodical assessment (= written examination) counts for 70%; the non-periodical continuous assessment (= various tasks and assignments) equally counts for 30%.

Students have to pass **both parts** (= the periodical and the non-periodical assessments).

Results of 10 out of 20 and above on the periodical assessment or on the continuous assessment can be transferred to the second examination session.

Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the

course evaluation or obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for one of its parts cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (= 9).

#### **Facilities for Working Students**

1. Possible exemption from educational activities requiring student attendance.
2. Possible rescheduling of the examination to a different time in the same academic year
3. Alternative time for feedback is possible
