Modern Japanese

Position of the course

This advanced course wants to train the students in reading authentic texts in modern Japanese and to increase the speaking and listening skills. Students are taught how to converse with a native speaker on specialised themes.

Contents

Reading non-adapted texts (literature, newspapers, specialist literature, etc.) in modern Japanese with an increasing level of difficulty. The student must prepare each text beforehand. Every student must also read a set of reading matter on his own. Studying audio-visual material. In the practical lessons the student will write short essays and give short lectures in Japanese. Students will be drilled in the various levels of the honorific language.

Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course Japanese IV or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

Final competences

- 1 To have active knowledge of about 1100 Sino-Japanese characters.
- 2 To be able to interpret and translate specialised texts independently.
- 3 To have a more specialised vocabulary of modern Japanese (speak, read, write and understand).
- 4 To be able to have conversations with a native speaker on more specialised themes.
- 5 To be able to read, interpret and translate all forms of written modern Japanese (newspaper style, modern literature, professional literature etc) by means of different lexica.

Teaching methods

Seminar, Lecture

Extra information on the teaching methods

- Lectures: The teaching of the theory (vocabulary, grammar) is done by the lecturer and co-lecturer.
- Seminars: The exercises are presented by the lecturer en co-lecturers and deal with practicing and applying the theory under guidance. The students are trained in speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. Basic dialogues and simple conversations are trained by means of a role play.
- Independent work: the students also receive a portfolio that has to be made individually.

Assessment form

There is an oral examination. The oral examination stresses grammar, speaking and listening skills. Students are required to present a text that has not been discussed during class hours and should be able to talk about more specialised topics concerning Japan. The written exam focuses on translation, grammar and reading as well as writing skills.

The student has to pass both parts of the exam in order to pass the course.

There is also a non-periodical assessment in form of a written exam and a portfolio assignment.
