Position of the course

This introductory course forms part of a series of Domain-specific knowledge: chronological overviews that reproduce the complete spectrum of archaeological training offered by the department. In this particular case the study of the provincial-Roman, mediaeval and early modern periods in Europe, Western Europe in particular.

Contents

Gallo-Roman period: the course concerns different aspects (capita selecta, as military

archaeology, settlements, economic development and material culture) as well as a global overview of the historical development of the Roman provinces in our region.

Middle Ages and later: the course treats a number of sub-aspects such as urban settlement and growth, rural settlement, development of military and religious power centres, material culture, etc.

Initial competences

Accessible to all students, without specific previous knowledge.

Final competences

- 1 To have a general insight into the developments in the Roman, mediaeval and post-mediaeval periods in Western Europe.
- 2 To have a basic knowledge of a number of research topics of the archaeology of the Roman, mediaeval and post-mediaeval periods.
- 3 To understand the evolution of the studied topics in general.
- 4 To be able to incorporate the different fields in an overview of the era in a critical way.
- 5 To be able to place the results of the archaeological study of the different fields within its historical context.
