Position of the course

This introductory course is part of the course package 'Domain-specific knowledge: Chronological Overviews', which aims to provide a fairly complete spectrum of archeology offered by the course. In this case, the course aims to provide a global overview of Classical Mediterranean archeology (Greece and Rome, including Etruria).

Contents

Chronologically structured overview of the archaeological legacy of the ancient cultures of the Mediterranean area from the Minoan period to Late Roman Antiquity, with an eye for the use of sources and historical criticism. Within this course, the archaeology of this period and this region is approached from an art-historical perspective.
