**Position of the course**

As part of the Domain-specific knowledge courses, this advanced course is specifically aiming at a deeper and larger knowledge gathered in the first year. In this case: study of the protohistory (Bronze Age and Iron Age) of NW Europe and the Low Countries from the end of the 3rd millennium until the arrival of the Romans.

**Contents**

Detailed overview of the occupation history of the Low Countries in the Bronze Age and the Iron Age, related to the neighbouring countries. There is a focus on chronology, settlement patterns and structures, funeral practices, religion and ideology, social and economic aspects of the period, material culture, etc.

**Initial competences**

To have successfully completed the course Prehistory and Protohistory.

**Final competences**

- 1 To have a thorough critical insight into the evolution and processes occurring during the Bronze Age and the Iron Age in the Low Countries and in surrounding areas.
- 2 To have (basic) knowledge of the diversity and complexity of cultures from the Metal Ages in the Low Countries.
- 3 To be able to reflect critically on evolutions, developments and processes which characterise the Metal Ages in the Low Countries.
