This advanced course belongs to "Overview 2", and aims to deepen the acquired skills of the first year. In this case to obtain an insight into the archaeology of some Near Eastern regions and topics (like architecture, religion, glyptic, administration, burial, ...).

Contents

Capita selecta. The archaeology of the Near East. The archaeology and art of the Ancient Near East from the Proto-Neolithic to the bronze age. This course aims to acquaint the students with certain important archaeological sites, monuments, art and social developments.

To have successfully completed the course Archaeology of the Near East or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.
