Position of the course

This advanced course belongs to package "Material practice" and has the aim to learn the student how to handle archaeological artefacts. It is a further deepening of the course "Introduction to the study of materials". In this course a closer look is provided in typology and techniques of different categories of material from the Ancient Near East.

Contents

Survey and discussion of some important groups of materials and objects from the Near East (typology, material and technology) by means of introductory lessons, literature intensive workshops at and outside of the UGent.

To have successfully completed the course "Introduction to the study of materials" or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

- 1 To be able to manage material on different levels.
- 2 To have a deeper insight into the typology and technology of diverse materials of the Ancient Near East.
- 3 To have an insight into the chronological developments.

This course consists of some lectures (up to 30% online), in preparation of the practical exercises. Students have to identify, describe, document and draw objects. They also have to prepare a paper and a powerpoint-presentation on a specific material. After presentation and evaluation, these are provided to the other students. Specialised workshops can occasionally be offered by guest lecturers, in or outside the university.
