Position of the course

This basic course helps students acquire a profound knowledge of the history of ancient philosophy. The course familiarises students with the problem of the sources and with the most important methodologies.

Contents

Chronological presentation of the most important periods, currents and philosophers, starting with the Archaic Period and ending with Late Antiquity.

Initial competences

To have elementary knowledge of the history of Greece and Rome.

Final competences

- 1 To be able to recognize and situate the most important philosophical authors.
- 2 To be able to recognize and situate the most important philosophical schools.
- 3 To be able to reproduce the most important tenets of the ancient philosophical schools.
- 4 To have insight into the internal development of ancient philosophy and into the interaction with the general social and historical developments.
- 5 To have insight into the development of ancient philosophy and its interaction with the general social and historical developments.
- 6 To learn using the most important heuristic, bibliographical tools for the study of the history of ancient philosophy.
- 7 To learn to read ancient philosophical texts independently and to learn to write a paper about this type of texts.

Assessment form

Written with open questions (97,5%): both on knowledge and insight; comparisons. Part of the periodic evaluation will assess the own, critical lecture of the syllabus of primary texts (by means of essay questions). During the course, these texts will be discussed and there will also be room for questions/feedback about this syllabus during the lessons.

Oral examination possible for minores-students or students with extra facilities.

Ufora offers a complete study-vademecum (examples of questions from exams etc.) ; there is a trial exam in November or December; we solve example-questions in class.

The NPE (2,5%) consists of a bibliographical assignment to learn to use the heuristic means specific to ancient philosophy in order to find recent publications on a topic individually assigned.

When students do not participate in one or more parts of the evaluation (exercises, exam) or obtains less than half of the points of one or more such parts, it is not possible to pass for the whole of the course. In case the final score is 10 or more out of 20, this grade will be reduced to the highest possible not-passed grade (i.e. 9/20).

Second chance

The student can keep partial credits, if acquired on one of the parts during the first examination period, and only needs to partake in the other part. In case the final score is 10 or more out of 20, but the score on one of the parts is again insufficient, the final total grade will be reduced to the highest possible not-passed grade (i.e. 9/20).

Calculation of the examination mark

Periodical (97,5 %); non-periodical (2,5 %)
