Position of the course

- Provide well-founded, scientific knowledge and insights about African history and the impact of this history on mentalities, global relations and contemporary African societies.
- Broaden insights in historiographic methods and scientific methodology from other disciplines that are relevant to the field of African history
- Broaden knowledge about and insight in social theories relevant to the field of African history
- Set up historical research about Africa and apply knowledge and insights regarding African history and historiography on a scientific level.
- Communicating about research methods and results with fellow student and laypersons
- Develop own critical, well-funded, scientific views on Africa within a temporal, spatial and social framework

Contents

This research seminar focuses on specific themes and topics in African history. For 2024-2025 the topic is (colonial) violence. That violence was quintessential to understanding colonialism is by now commonly acknowledged. However, conceptualizing violence is a difficult task, as it includes a wide range of practices as well as motives.

In the class we will engage with more conceptual, often foundational, texts on violence, and couple them to specific case-studies. Some of the themes that will be discussed are: genocide, settler colonialism, everyday violence, counterinsurgency etc.

Initial competences

Students are familiar with historiography and have a basic understanding of non-western or world history

Final competences

- 1 Students know and understand the important evolutions, movements and schools in African historiography, including the most recent debates
- 2 Students are able to independently set up an historical inquiry, select and apply the most relevant research methods from various disciplines, and to position their point of view and arguments in the scientific field.
- 3 Students are capable of communicating their research methods and results to their fellow students and laymen (written and spoken). Students are receptive to cooperation with experts in their own or related fields of study
- 4 Students adopt a critical attitude towards their own thinking, environment and contemporary international relations on the one hand, and towards past and current issues regarding power, the economy and culture in African states and societies on the other hand.
