Position of the course

The aim of this introductory course is a refinement of the practical use of English, particularly of the grammar, the vocabulary, the writing skills, the speaking and listening skills. It helps students gain confidence for spoken and written communication in English as required in everyday contexts.

Contents

On the one hand, the course practises **speaking** and **writing** skills through a range of topics and exercises related to English language use in everyday contexts. On the other hand, it trains students to analyse, identify and explain correct **grammatical** usage of Standard English using acquired terminology. Moreover, active and passive **vocabulary** are expanded through independent work.

Initial competences

- To master English at level CEFR-B2.1 (of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages — [CEFR](#)), i.e. first stage of independent (“Vantage”) proficiency.
- To master the basic concepts of pedagogical grammars of English used in Flanders at secondary level.

Final competences

- 1 To have consolidated the English proficiency at “Upper intermediate”/“Vantage” (B2) level to B2.2 (i.e. functional independent proficiency) (CEFR).
- 2 To master the English vocabulary actively and passively on an advanced level.
- 3 To have both theoretical and practical insight into the grammar of Standard British English.
- 4 To have the confidence and skills to communicate in English in a free and spontaneous way.
- 5 To have conversational skills in English on an advanced level (speaking + listening).
- 6 To have writing skills in English on an advanced level.
- 7 To make use of digital methods to work collaboratively on project-based research processes.
