Position of the course

This specialized course focuses on the study of modern South Asian languages from a linguistic, sociocultural and religious perspective. Firstly, this course offers a linguistic overview of the Indo-Aryan languages and their historical background. "Vernacularisation" will be a topic discussed in relation to literary texts from Rajasthani, Kashmiri and Maithili. Secondly, the development of Hindi and Urdu to today's context is investigated. Third, through a number of contemporary texts issues about language politics, language minorities and identity are illustrated.

Contents

- 1 Critical reading and analysis of texts (in different styles of Hindi and close variants such as Marwari, Urdu, etc.) related to socio-cultural issues in modern and historical India.
- 2 Reading, analysing and discussing texts from Hindi literature (advanced level)
- 3 Presenting of a sociocultural topic related to language (and politics)

Initial competences

A thorough knowledge of Hindi and/or Sanskrit grammar and literature, and of the basics of contemporary South Asian society.

Final competences

- 1 To demonstrate insight into the socio-cultural and language related issues discussed in the course and to show understanding of the cultural specificity of Indian issues.
- 2 Being able to analyse and explain texts read in class from the repertoire of Hindi literature (advanced level).
- 3 Being able to autonomously present, analyse and explain a text from the repertoire of Hindi literature (advanced level).
- 4 Being able to write an essay about a socio-cultural topic related to Indian literature (advanced level).

Calculation of the examination mark

Oral exam evaluation (20%)

presentation (30%)

Paper: 50%

Paper second exam period: 30%
