Position of the course

This is an advanced course which aims to give students a deeper insight into the key issues of the Ukrainian historiography, language situation and identity. In particular, it discusses the ideological differences that led to the Russian attack on Ukraine in 2022.

Contents

The course examines what people historically thought and still think in Ukraine and Russia on the following issues:

1 Historically, is Ukraine a different country from Russia?

2 Is Ukrainian a different language than Russian?

3 How did Ukrainian identity come about?

The introductory lectures provide an overview of the main points of discussion related to Ukrainian history, historical politics, language, nation-building and identity, which are historically contested by Russia. Furthermore, these controversial points are studied based on teacher-provided or indicated resources. Not only scholarly texts are discussed, but also ideological and propaganda texts. Students present the results of their studies from different ideological points of view during the seminars and discuss them in group with the teacher.

Initial competences

Have an academic Bachelor's degree or after permission from the teacher. Meet the language requirements for Dutch. Proficiency in Ukrainian or Russian is not necessary. If it exists, it can be used. Prior knowledge of the political and social history of Ukraine and Russia is not required, although it can be an advantage.

Final competences

- 1 To understand the contemporary problems and interpretations of historical, political, linguistic and cultural phenomena connected with Ukraine.
- 2 To understand and interpret scientific (historiographical, linguistic and other) texts in Russian or in western languages.
- 3 To understand and judge back through time social assumptions of scientific publications in the field of Ukrainian studies.
- 4 To understand the dynamics between politics, society, language and culture in

Ukraine in diachronic and synchronic perspective.

- 5 To be able to find information in scientific literature and use it in a discussion.
- 6 To report and present orally or in written form on own research.

Extra information on the examination methods

Non-periodical evaluation: oral presentations on a self-chosen or teacher-specified topic that reflects one of the existing points of view in the discussion. After some introductory lectures, the students read and summarise primary sources and scientific literature related to the issues of the seminars and prepare their participation in the discussion. EELC students, as well as other students who know the Russian language, prefer to work with sources in Russian. Students who do not know Russian, work with sources in the Western or Slavic languages known to them. The students orally present and analyze the content of read publications. The revised presentations and summaries of the sources read are later issued as papers. Active participation in the seminars is mandatory in order to succeed.

Periodic evaluation: a classic oral exam. Each student is given two questions about the history and modernity of Ukraine and about the factors of its nation-building. The exam takes the form of a conversation and serves not only to test factual knowledge, but above all to test the student's ability to critically interpret different points of view on a certain point of discussion and to consciously adopt his own point of view.

Calculation of the examination mark

Non-periodical: paper (30%), presentations (40%).

Periodical: oral examination (30%).

If a student does not participate in the evaluation of one or more parts, he/she can no longer pass the entire course. If the average final score is still a grade of ten or more out of twenty, this will be reduced to the highest non-deliberative grade (= 8/20).

Facilities for Working Students
