### Teaching languages

Chinese, Dutch

### Keywords

Modern Chinese, oral language, written language, grammar, vocabulary, pronunciation, listening comprehension, reading, translation, dialogue.

### Position of the course

The course teaches the students the elementary vocabulary and basic structures of Modern Chinese. Students will be taught how to translate sentences of an elementary level from Chinese to Dutch and vice versa. They are offered the elementary skills in listening comprehension, reading comprehension, writing skills, oral skills, and grammatical analysis.

### Contents

By means of dialogues and texts on specific situations in everyday life in China, the elementary vocabulary and basic grammatical structures of Chinese are taught and practised. The students learn how to write, read, pronounce and understand the vocabulary. They learn how to use this vocabulary and grammar both orally and in written form.

### Initial competences

To have successfully completed the course 'Modern Chinese I' or to have acquired the necessary skills by other means.

### Final competences

- 1 To have an elementary oral and written knowledge of the Chinese language;
- 2 To be able to make simple translations from Dutch to Chinese and vice versa;
- 3 To master the elementary vocabulary of Modern Chinese (reading, writing, understanding, speaking);
- 4 To understand the basic structures of the syntax of Modern Chinese, and to be able to analyse and use them;
- 5 To be able to have a dialogue at an elementary level with a native speaker.

In formal lectures, the theoretical framework, the basic vocabulary and the grammar are explained by a lecturer. ### Course content-related study coaching

In the practical language acquisition classes, with the help of a language lecturer and native speaker, all theoretical knowledge is immediately put into practice. These classes consist of conversation exercises, listening exercises, and written exercises. In the conversation exercises, immediate feedback is possible. The written exercises are corrected by the language lecturer and discussed with the individual student. This guarantees a quick feedback for the individual student. The students have the opportunity to individually and at personal pace make translation exercises. When needed, these are discussed individually with the student.

Oral and written exercises are supported also through Ufora.

Continuous (20 %) and End-of-term (80 %) assessment

Assessment form

Continuous assessment (20 %): On a test moment during the semester, the knowledge of the vocabulary and grammar is tested. This is done through a dictation, written translation exercises (Dutch-Chinese and Chinese-Dutch), grammatical analysis, listening comprehension and conversation.

End-of-term assessment (80 %): The end-of-term exam consists of three parts: (1) listening and speaking comprehension, (2) reading and writing comprehension, and (3) translation and grammatical analysis. The part listening and speaking comprehension consists of a test on listening comprehension (language laboratory)

and a test on conversation skills (with a native speaker). The part writing comprehension is a dictation. The part translation and grammatical analysis consists of a written and oral translation Dutch-Chinese and Chinese-Dutch, as well as an exercise on grammatical analysis (written).

(If a student does not pass for the whole of the continuous and the end-of-term assessment, there is a possibility to do a resit exam and the second examination period. This exam consist of the complete subject matter and all parts (listening and speaking comprehension, reading and writing comprehension, and translation and grammatical analysis)(100%). )

#### **Calculation of the examination mark**

Continuous evaluation: 20 % + periodic evaluation: 80 %. The student has to pass for each of the three parts of the continuous and periodic evaluation ((1) listening and speaking comprehension, (2) reading and writing comprehension, and (3) translation and grammatical analysis) separately, as well as for the total 100 %. Students who do not take part in the assessment of one or more parts of the course evaluation or obtain a mark of less than 10/20 for one of its parts cannot pass the course evaluation. Should the average mark be higher than 10/20, the final mark will be reduced to the highest non-pass mark (=9).

#### **Facilities for Working Students**
