### Position of the course

This advanced course is an optional course within the Master's programme in archaeology and is linked to the chosen topic and/or period for the Master's thesis.

### Contents

Critical discussion of a series of capita selecta in the archaeology of the historical periods in NW Europe. Specific emphasis is placed on a trans-periodic analysis of socio-economic and cultural processes and their material reflection and characterisation on the basis of interdisciplinary study. The required portfolio may include a combination of lectures, guest lectures by national and international speakers, group work and presentations, discussion groups, participation in workshops or attending lectures, visits to museums, exhibitions or archaeological sites concerning the Historical Archaeology of NW Europe.

At the beginning of the semester, a detailed description of the subject and the expectations will be announced via the online student platform.

The language of instruction is Dutch, but some lessons may be taught in English or French.

### Initial competences

This course builds on certain competences of the Bachelor's programme in Archaeology, more specifically on the course 'Archaeology of the Historic Periods' (Ba1). It is strongly recommended to have followed the courses 'Medieval Archaeology', 'Provincial and Roman Archaeology' and the corresponding material study courses (Ba2/3).

At least a passive knowledge of English and French for consulting professional literature.

### **Final competences**

- 8 Writing down your own archaeological research in a high-quality report
- 9 Present and justify own archaeological research to experts, peers and non-experts.
- 10 Communicating, cooperating and acting in an appropriate, inspiring, advisory or authoritative manner.
