**Position of the course**

The objective of this course is to give students a more profound insight in certain themes and/or regions in African history.

**Contents**

This course deals with the transition from precolonial history of Central Africa (now DRCongo, Tanzania and Angola) to the colonial period with the installation of Belgian, British, German, French and Portuguese colonies in the same region (ca. 1850-1920). It discusses political and economic changes and conflicts, but also the cultural and economic consequences in Central Africa and the metropole. Hence, aggression and resistance of colonizers and colonized will be discussed, but also the tensions between colonial powers, between local communities and internal conflicts within Belgian colonial rule. Finally, part of the lessons will be devoted to the legitimization of colonial rule through colonial propaganda, with far-reaching consequences until today.

**Initial competences**

Having taken the course History of Africa I or II, or having taken classes in political or social sciences with a geographical focus on Africa is advised although not compulsory.

**Final competences**

- 1 To have profound knowledge and insight in the region Central Africa and in the most important themes and dynamics that have shaped this region
- 2 To have insight in the theoretical frameworks of the themes studied, to be able to use these frameworks to analyze the history of this region and to understand

- how these frameworks can be used for understanding other regions
- 3 To understand how past and present are connected and to be able to explain *longue durée* historical processes
- 4 To have insight in the importance of different geographical scales (communities, states, nations, regions etc.) and how they interact with each other
- 5 To have insight in how our perception of certain themes and regions is shaped by academic literature as well as through different media channels, throughout time
