Classical Japanese (*bungo*), Japanese language

Position of the course

This course is the second of four subsequent courses (Bungo II, III, IV, and V) that form an integral whole and introduce you in 16 exercises in total into the most significant grammatical phenomena and structures that distinguish *bungo* (so-called "classical Japanese") from the spoken language or *kōgo* (so-called "modern Japanese"; on the distinction of the two, please, consult the section "Position of the course" for the course "Bungo I").

In this course, Bungo III, you will be made familiar with conditional clauses, the use of certain particles and auxiliary verbal suffixes, and other grammatical phenomena. By means of extensive practical exercises you will learn to analyse and understand shorter *bungo* texts and text fragments from ancient times to the modern period, that are on a more advanced level of grammatical complexity.

These texts will also serve as vehicles to make excursions into the realm of social, cultural and intellectual history in order to expand your general knowledge about modern and pre-modern Japan. Moreover, you will deepen your insight into the grammatical theory and logic of Japanese in general, and of *bungo* in particular.

Contents

In the four exercises of the course Bungo III (exercises 5-8) you will be made familiar with the formation of real and hypothetical conditional clauses and the use of the particle "*ba*" (exercise 5), with the particle "*ga*" in *bungo* and the old copula *nari* (exercise 6), with the formation of the past tense by means of the *jodōshi* "*ki*" (exercise 7); and with the perfective aspect by means of the *jodōshi* "*nu*" and "*tsu*" (exercise 8).

You will also encounter additional particles and other parts of speech, that are likewise exquisite features of *bungo*, but do not deserve whole exercises of their own, and you will deepen your insight in the grammatical theory and logic of Japanese in general, and of *bungo* in particular. Our exercise texts range from the oldest *Manyōshū*-poetry to modern *haiku* and *tanka* describing the nuclear holocaust of 1945, or the Japanese version of Schubert's song, *The Linden Tree*. Thus, here too we will use *bungo* again as a time machine to jump back and forth through the millennia, and to visit historically, culturally and philosophically interesting sites and issues, that are indispensable building blocks for a decent

body of Japan-related knowledge.

Initial competences

- This course is based on the knowledge acquired in the courses Bungo I and II.
- To have a passive knowledge of English.

Final competences

- 1 Being able to systematically understand of more complex grammatical structures of classical Japanese.
- 2 Analysing and translating original source material by using dictionaries and other linguistic tools
- 3 Grasping significant texts in their historical, religio-philosophical, social and cultural contexts
- 4 Knowing (Classical) Japanese vocabulary and characters, as well as grammatical terms and concepts to analyze and tackle bungo
- 5 Being able to explain the evolution of the Japanese writing system and written Japanese.
- 6 Using digital tools and resources (online tools, dictionaries, etc.).
