'creative criticism', literary criticism, art criticism, the essay as literary genre, writing and editorial practices

### Position of the course

'Criticism' is taken in this course in the English sense of the word: as the outcome of a writing practice in which an individual writer ('the critic'), on the basis of a personal, yet well-founded reflection on a literary text or an art object, and in a style and from a perspective that is suggestive of the personality of the critic, formulates a judgment ('krinein'). The judgment in question is not limited to the literary text or art work at hand, but is also directed to larger issues that the critic means to discuss. In this tradition of essayistic reflection, the critical approach is often opposed to the scientific approach of the 'scholar'. While the latter approach is mainly targeted to the academic transfer of objective and factual knowledge, the critic's approach can be seen as an attempt to develop a personal point of view, developed in dialogue with the opinions of others.

In the course, students are first familiarized with the principles of this critical tradition, but then mainly invited to try and put these into practice. The course is for the most part conceived as a 'writing clinic': by means of a number of specific writing assignments, the students develop a personal essay which is seen as the course's final assignment. In the course of the series the students will receive thorough feedback, from both teachers and from their fellow students. After the completion of the course, students will be able (on a voluntary basis) to submit their work for publication in De Schrijftafel, the annual booklet that since the introduction of the courses serves as the 'home' publication of the programme Vergelijkende Moderne Letterkunde. A group of students serves as the editorial team of De Schrijftafel.

### Contents

In the reading and discussion seminar a number of classical and contemporary essays (by, among others, Rachel Cusk, Susan Sontag, Maggie Nelson, Roland Barthes and Ben Lerner) are read and discussed.

In the course's 'writing clinic' the students are encouraged to develop their own writing samples into a final essay. The classes also serve as spaces where the students are editorial techniques.

### Initial competences

Since this is a master's course, students are expected to have followed a number of bachelor's courses on literary and/or critical art theory.

### Final competences

- 1 To acquire insight in the 20th century debates that have shaped our ideas of 'criticism'
- 2 -To be able to recognise and assess the central principles of critical discourse
- 3 To be able to analyse the rhetorical and argumentative structure of critical writings.
- 4 To be able to write a convincing critical text
- 5 To be able to formulate a personal evaluation on the basis of arguments.
