**Position of the course**

In this advanced course, required for the final completion of the MA studies, the student is asked to demonstrate their mastery of a selection of final curricular competencies by writing a Master dissertation of approximately 25,000 words (possibly with attachments) that will be defended in an oral presentation. The student is able to independently process the available (inter)national scientific research in the domain of teaching in general and their discipline in particular and to apply insights in their own classroom and school context. The student is able to complete a full research cycle on an education-relevant topic and to report on it in accordance with scientific criteria.

**Contents**

Determined in close consultation with and having the approval of a supervisor, the thesis topic should be original and innovative. The student submits a research paper (= MA dissertation) based on a literature review and possibly corpus of primary sources or field research on a subject within the core areas of the study programme. The supervisor will hold a PhD in an area connected to the study programme. The MA dissertation focuses on the integration of African Studies competences and competences related to teaching. This integration can be achieved in two ways:

- (a) A domain-specific scientific research in African Studies, including an educational translation.
- (b) An education-relevant problem definition, in which the teaching component forms the starting point of (didactic) research in African Studies.

**Initial competences**

Bachelor in African Languages and Cultures or upon approval of the programme committee.

**Final competences**

- 1 Advanced knowledge and comprehension of and insight into the scientific knowledge related to the study of African Languages and Cultures in general, and of methods, concepts and/or theories pertaining to the main subject in particular.

- 2 Ability to analyse scientific texts on African Languages and Cultures and one or more related disciplines involved in the programme (Linguistics, Anthropology, Literary Studies, History).
- 3 Ability to synthesize texts on the main subject and/or integrate insights from those texts.
- 4 Ability to apply research methods and techniques autonomously in an advanced setting.
- 5 Ability to reason from a multidisciplinary perspective.
- 6 Ability to report scientifically about one's own research to the profession and the professional field.
- 7 Educational master: The student is able to independently unlock the available (inter)national scientific research in the domain of teaching in general and their discipline in particular and to apply insights in their own classroom and school context.
- 8 Educational master: The student is able to complete a full research cycle on an education-relevant topic and to report on it in accordance with scientific criteria.
