Position of the course

This advanced course is an optional course within the Master's programme in archaeology and is linked to the chosen topic and/or period for the Master's thesis.

Contents

Critical discussion of a series of capita selecta of the archaeology of the Ancient Near East and the Phoenician-Punic world.

Data on a particular theme are studied from an archaeological/iconographic point of view in combination with information known from philological sources. A particular theme will form the common thread throughout the series of lessons. For the archaeology part of the Near East for example: the cult of the dead (cemeteries, tomb architecture, grave finds, grave reliefs, texts (e. g. about Kispum)) or warfare (using Assyrian palace reliefs, descriptions of Assyrian campaigns, iconographic and textual sources etc.). For the part archaeology of the Phoenician-Punic world the same theme as for the Near East or another theme can be studied.

The concrete contents will be announced annually through Ufora at the latest on the first day of the academic year.

The required portfolio can include: participation in workshops, attending lectures, (virtual) visits to museums, exhibitions or archaeological sites concerning archaeology of the Ancient Near East and the Phoenician-Punic world.

The working language of this course is Dutch, but some (online) lessons can be given in English.

Initial competences

This course builds on certain final competences of the Bachelor's programme in Archaeology, more specifically on the course 'Archaeology of the Near East' (Ba1). It is strongly recommended to have followed the course 'Archaeology of the Ancient Near East' and 'Archaeology of the Phoenician-Punic world', and the corresponding material study courses (Ba2/3).

At least passive knowledge of English, French and German in order to be able to consult

professional literature.

Group work: Preparation of a presentation in small groups.

Lectures: limited number of presentations by lecturers and/or guest lecturers (up to 50% online).

Microteaching: student presentations around the chosen year themes.

Online discussion group: students are encouraged to discuss specific topics from the class via UFORA.

Project: students research a theme from different disciplines.

Workshop: exercises during the meetings.

Independent work: writing a paper.

The exact number of hours per work format can vary annually, depending on the theme of the lessons.

For the sake of COVID19 , modified work forms can be rolled out if necessary.
