Position of the course

This introductory course provides an introduction to current developments in Eastern and South-Eastern Europe, as well as in less detail in the Caucasus and Central Asia, against a historical background. The aim is to get to know and understand the current political and social situation in the regions. The programme component aims to enable students to critically and adequately interpret current facts and events.

Contents

The course gives a brief overview of a selection of the following topics relating to Eastern and South-Eastern Europe:

1) geography, countries

2) Ethnicities, peoples and ethnic stereotypes,

- 3) population, demography and migration problems,
- 4) languages and dialects, language policy,
- 5) identities and their origin,
- 6) mythologies and religions,
- 7) State structures, leaders and influencers,
- 8) Wars, conflicts and frozen conflicts,
- 9) democracy, corruption, political protest and dissidence,
- 10) geopolitics, economy, transition, post-socialism

During the seminars, presentations are given on current issues of Eastern and South-Eastern Europe.

Initial competences

- 1 To have a global and critical knowledge of current developments in Eastern and South-Eastern Europe.
- 2 To adequately interpret political, social and philosophical facts, ideas and events.
- 3 To use problem-solving knowledge of and insight into current events in Eastern and South-Eastern Europe.
- 4 To understand current Eastern and South-Eastern European societies from their historical background and to detect questions and problems from the same background.
- 5 To gain an independent insight into current affairs in Eastern and South-Eastern Europe via news media.
- 6 Critical basic attitude towards and reflection on (dealing with) sources.
- 7 To give an oral presentation on contemporary Eastern and South-Eastern Europe.
