**Position of the course**

This course unit provides an introduction to Slavic philology on the basis of existing research literature and the accurate reading of original, non-normalised medieval Slavic texts. Knowledge of Old Slavonic is required.

**Contents**

The course approaches Slavic medieval writing culture strictly from the perspective of available primary sources. Reading original texts is therefore in the foreground and is further underpinned by a critical evaluation of existing research.

Four thematic blocks provide the course with a basic structure: (1) Slavic mission history between Byzantium and Rome, (2) Slavic written languages and writing culture (palaeography, codicology, literature of Slavia orthodoxa), (3) dissemination of Church Slavonic as a language of Slavia orthodoxa (Church Slavonic redactions), (4) non-Church Slavic writing traditions (ecclesiastical and secular).

**Extra information on the examination methods**

Research assignment (paper) based on a Medieval Slavonic text fragment in facsimile consisting of three components: (1) transcription, identification and philological commentary of an unknown medieval Slavic text fragment in facsimile, (2) determination of the language/recension of the text fragment, (3) identification of the cultural-historical background of the text fragment. The research assignment must be submitted during the first examination period. The latest submission date is announced in the first week of the term. Submission during the second examination period is possible, but the lecturer must be informed beforehand.
