Russian literature, Middle Ages – 21st century, historical survey, literary analysis

Position of the course

This introductory course aims to provide insight into the development of Russian literature from the Middle Ages until the 21st century through (fragments of) literary works of the most important Russian writers and poets. The student will also be introduced to fundamental concepts for analyzing poems and narrative prose and will be taught how to apply them on the basis of a selection of text (in Dutch for students who do not know Russian, in Russian or Dutch for students who do know Russian).

Contents

This overview of the development of Russian literature from the Middle Ages until today is illustrated with fragments from novels, short stories, plays and/or poems by canonical writers, from the *Primary Chronicle* via Karamzin and Puškin, Dostoevskij and Tolstoj, Majakovskij and Achmatova to Solženicyn and Sorokin. Particular attention is devoted to the literary and cultural context. Besides, several longer texts or textfragments will be subjected to a more thorough literary analysis.

Initial competences

No specific competencies required apart from the expected average competencies acquired during secondary education.

Final competences

- 1 To have critical insight into the qualities and historical specificities of Russian literature.
- 2 To read and interpret (fragments of) lyrical, prose and / or dramatic texts in the original language or in translation.
- 3 To situate Russian (canonical) literary texts in their literary and social context.
- 4 To analyze Russian literary texts.
- 5 To apply the basic insights and basic terminology of literary analysis.
- 6 To write a short paper on a literary work on the basis of a concrete research assignment (text based).
- 7 To reflect critically and comment in a constructive way on a paper by peers and to formulate one's thoughts in a short report.
- 8 To find information in secondary literature (a.o. textbooks and surveys) and use this information in a paper.

Teaching methods

Group work, Seminar, Lecture, Independent work

Extra information on the teaching methods

Historical survey (lectures).

Interactive seminar: students prepare by reading literary texts before each seminar, in which the texts are being analysed.

Independent work: multiple, but short written analyses of a literary text on the basis of concrete questions for analysis; two peer review reports; a reading list.

Learning materials and price

Reader with poems, stories and fragments (Ufora).

Students who read Russian and Dutch: O. Boele en B. Dhooge, *Van Poesjkin tot Zamjatin. 18 geannoteerde verhalen uit de Russische literatuur*. Amsterdam: Pegasus, 2020. (appr. € 25)

This reader is also used for the course Russian literature: capita selecta. The students can decide for themselves whether or not to purchase this reader. The texts in this reader that are being discussed in the seminar are not provided via Ufora.

Calculation of the examination mark
